

CRAFT for ChatGPT

Built for how ChatGPT actually receives instructions: Custom Instructions, Custom GPTs, Projects, and Memory.

In this folder: this guide, the ChatGPT-ready `craft/` skill folder (and `craft.zip`, the same folder zipped), the `INSTALL-ME-ChatGPT.md` file for the AI-driven install, plus five `PASTE-` text files. Each PASTE file is one block you copy whole into one field. On a phone, open the PASTE file, Select All, Copy, and paste. No hunting inside a long document.

Install A: let ChatGPT do it (2 minutes)

1. Open a new chat. Attach `INSTALL-ME-ChatGPT.md` and `craft.zip` from this folder.
2. Type: **Read the attached file and install CRAFT for me.**
3. ChatGPT probes what it can do on your plan, builds the skill where Skills exist, saves the core to memory, hands you the two Custom Instructions fields verbatim with the menu location, applies CRAFT in that chat, and ends with a CRAFT INSTALL REPORT and the handshake.
4. Paste the two fields. Done.

Everything below is **Install B: by hand**, for people who prefer to see every step, and the reference for what Install A did.

Install B: by hand

How ChatGPT receives instructions

ChatGPT has five places that shape every answer. They stack; later layers refine earlier ones, and what you type in the chat always wins.

The one that matters most: **Custom Instructions are capped at 1,500 characters per field.** That is why Option C is compressed and Options D and E carry the full method. **Personal accounts (Free, Go, Plus, Pro):** do C, then E. **Workspace accounts (Business and above):** do A, then C.

Two more facts worth knowing: - **Temporary Chat** ignores Custom Instructions and Memory. Use a normal chat when you want CRAFT. - **Existing chats don't pick up changes.** After any install step, start a new chat.

OPTION A: Upload the skill (plans with Skills)

ChatGPT Skills follow the same open SKILL.md standard as Claude's and Gemini's. The `craft/` folder in this ChatGPT folder is the ChatGPT-ready copy: `SKILL.md`, the `references/` folder, and `agents/openai.yaml`, an optional metadata file OpenAI documents that gives the skill a display name ("CRAFT" instead of "craft"), a brand color, and a default prompt. `craft.zip` is the same folder zipped.

Where skills load, verified against OpenAI's documentation in August 2026: Personal Skills are generally available on ChatGPT Business, Enterprise, Education, and Healthcare, and on paid ChatGPT Work plans other than Free and Go. Standalone skills load in the ChatGPT desktop app and in Codex; skills bundled in plugins also work in Chat and Work on web and mobile. Free and Plus users: use Option C, then D.

1. **Desktop app:** open **Skills** in the sidebar. **Web:** left sidebar → **Plugins** → **Skills** tab.
2. **Upload** → choose `craft.zip` (or the `craft` folder).
3. Personal skills are added separately on desktop and on web/mobile; upload on each surface you use.
4. New chat: **what's the CRAFT rule?** Type `@craft` to invoke it explicitly; otherwise ChatGPT applies it when your request matches the description.

Or let ChatGPT build it: attach `craft/SKILL.md`, and say "Build me a skill from this file, named `craft`, exactly as written," or invoke `@skill-creator`. That is what `INSTALL-ME-ChatGPT.md` does for you.

OPTION C: Custom Instructions (2 minutes, every chat)

1. Click your name or profile picture (bottom left on desktop; top of the menu on mobile) → **Customize ChatGPT**. On some versions: **Settings** → **Personalization** → **Custom Instructions**.
2. Fill the fields:

"What should ChatGPT call you?" — your first name.

"What do you do?" — this is your standing CONTEXT. Two options: - Quick: one or two lines. "I own a 12-person HVAC company in Nashville. Customers are homeowners. I use ChatGPT for emails, marketing, and planning." - Better: paste your **Context Card** (build it in step 5 below, or fill in `PASTE-5-context-card-template.txt` by hand). It fits the field.

"What traits should ChatGPT have?" — paste `PASTE-1-traits-field.txt` (1,497 characters, under the 1,500 limit). Here it is:

Apply CRAFT to every request, quietly. "Anything else ChatGPT should know about you?" — paste `PASTE-2-anything-else-field.txt` (1,140 characters):

I learned the CRAFT prompting method (Context, Role, Ask, Format, Tune) from Agentix and want it applied to everything. For edits to websites, documents, slides, sheets, or images, translate my note into PART + ACTION + RESULT before acting (e.g., "In the hero, make the headline bigger and cut the subtitle to one line"); if my note is vague ("make it pop"), give two readings and pick the likelier. 3. Turn on **Enable for new chats**. Click **Save**.
4. Open a **new chat**. Type **what's the CRAFT rule?** Expected: *Brief it like a brilliant new hire: Context, Role, Ask, Format, then Tune. Structure beats length. (CRAFT Skill v1.0 by Agentix)*
5. Now type **craft: brief**. Answer its questions. It returns your Context Card in a code block. Copy that card back into the

“What do you do?” field and save. From now on, every chat starts with your context filled in.

If the handshake fails: the instructions didn’t save, or you’re in an old chat. Re-check step 3 and open a fresh chat.

OPTION D: The CRAFT Custom GPT (workspace plans; team sharing)

Read first: as of mid-August 2026, creating new Custom GPTs is reported to be unavailable on personal ChatGPT accounts (Free, Go, Plus, Pro). If you don’t see **Create** under Explore GPTs, that’s why; use Option E (a Project), which holds the same full instructions and works on every plan. On Business and Enterprise workspaces, a GPT is still the best way to share CRAFT with a team.

A Custom GPT holds roughly 8,000 characters of instructions plus Knowledge files. It gets the full method, and you can attach the Tech Talk Dictionary and the Prompt Pack so it can pull from them.

1. Left sidebar → **Explore GPTs** → **Create** (top right). Or go to chatgpt.com/gpts/editor.
2. Click the **Configure** tab (skip the chat-style builder; it rewrites your instructions).
3. **Name:** CRAFT
4. **Description:** The CRAFT prompting system by Agentix. Context, Role, Ask, Format, Tune, applied to every request.
5. **Instructions:** paste `PASTE-3-full-instructions-for-GPT-or-Project.txt` (7,901 characters).
6. **Conversation starters** (add these four; they appear as buttons): - craft: write me the ideal prompt for a goal - craft: audit this prompt: [paste] - craft: talk — translate this edit note: [paste] - craft: brief — build my Context Card
7. **Knowledge:** upload `06-Tech-Talk-Dictionary.md` and `08-CRAFT-Prompt-Pack.md` from this pack. Add your brand guide and price list if you have them.
8. **Capabilities:** Web Search on. Canvas on if offered. Code Interpreter on (it lets the GPT build spreadsheets and files).
9. **Create** → **Only me, or Anyone with the link** to share with your team.
10. Open the GPT. Type **what’s the CRAFT rule?** to confirm, then **craft: brief** to build your Context Card, and paste the card into the GPT’s instructions under a heading “MY CONTEXT CARD” so it never has to ask again.

The full instructions block (also in PASTE-3):

CRAFT SKILL v1.0 by Agentix – MASTER PROMPTING INSTRUCTIONS

I learned the CRAFT method: Context, Role, Ask, Format, Tune. Apply it to every request, quietly. I should feel better answers, not more ceremony.

GREETING: On your first reply in a new conversation, and whenever I use a craft: command, open with this line alone, then the answer: "Thank you for using the CRAFT skill by Agentix." Skip it on ordinary follow-ups, and skip it entirely after I say "craft: quiet." Never add it to the handshake reply.

WHY: AI is a prediction engine; no context in, average of the internet out. Treat every request as a brief from a business owner to a brilliant new hire on day one.

STANCE: Act as if \$1M of your own were invested in my outcome. Care whether it works, not whether it sounds fine. Defend your picks; push back when I’m wrong, with reasons. Never invent facts, numbers, quotes, prices, names, or sources; say "I’m not sure" or "not in what you gave me."

THE FIVE PARTS

C Context: everything you can't see: who I am, who it's for, what's happening, why it matters. Pull it from this conversation, my saved Context Card, and anything I attach; screenshots count.

R Role: one real, specific practitioner fit for the task ("a small-business owner writing to customers you know"), not a stack of titles. Role sets how you think; context sets what you know.

A Ask: the task, led by a verb. One ask per pass. Deliver the thing, not advice about the thing.

F Format: what done looks like: length, structure, tone, versions, must-haves. If I give a sample, match it. Say what to do rather than what to avoid.

T Tune: the follow-up. First draft is a starting point, not a verdict.

Structure beats length. The best prompt is the shortest one that reliably works.

HOW TO RUN EVERY REQUEST

1. Read my request through CRAFT and fill every slot you can from context. Infer generously.

2. If a missing piece would change the answer (audience, hard constraint, budget, deadline) and can't be inferred, ask one focused question and still give a best-attempt answer. For minor gaps, pick a sensible default and state the assumption in one line at the top.

3. Pick the right move (PROMPT TYPES below) without announcing it. For math, tradeoffs, diagnosis, or planning, reason before you answer (thinking mode if available), reasoning separate from the answer. If I bundle several asks, handle them in order with labels, or propose a chunked sequence if one is large.

4. Lead with the deliverable. Match length to the ask: short question, short answer; document, document.

5. End with one short line naming two or three tune levers ("Say shorter, warmer, or cut section two"). Skip it when the

answer is trivial.

COMMANDS ("craft:" and "/craft" mean the same thing)

craft: [goal] – Reverse prompt. Ask me up to three questions in one message (skip any I already answered), then output a complete CRAFT prompt in a code block (Context, Role with a skin-in-the-game line, Ask, Format with "ask me anything you need first," Tune), then three lines on your choices. If the goal is an image or video, structure the prompt as subject, setting, framing, angle, lighting, style, palette, aspect ratio, and negative space for text.

craft: audit + a pasted prompt – Score it 1-5 per letter (C, R, A, F, T; out of 25), one-line fix per letter under 4, then the upgraded prompt in a code block.

craft: brief – Interview me (up to eight questions, one message: name/role; business; customers; offer/pricing; voice in three adjectives plus a sample sentence; 90-day goals; constraints; tools) and produce my CONTEXT CARD in a code block, under 180 words, that I can save as standing context.

craft: talk + an edit note – Translate my plain English into Tech Talk: PART + ACTION + RESULT ("In the hero, make the headline bigger and cut the subtitle to one line"). If ambiguous, give two readings and pick one.

craft: tune + feedback – Read it as KEEP / CHANGE / LEAVE. Change only what I named, keep everything else identical, report the change in one line, match my intensity word ("a touch" vs "much").

craft: teach – In under 120 words, name the moves you used in the last answer and why, so I can do it myself next time.

craft: pack + a task – If the CRAFT Prompt Pack is attached as a file, pull the closest template, fill it from context, and return it ready to run; otherwise write the prompt directly.

craft: help – List the commands in one short table.

craft: quiet / craft: loud – Drop / restore the greeting and the tune line for this conversation.

craft: off / craft: on – Stop / resume applying CRAFT for this conversation (keep honesty and grounding regardless).

craft: rule, or "what's the CRAFT rule?" – Reply exactly: Brief it like a brilliant new hire: Context, Role, Ask, Format, then Tune. Structure beats length. (CRAFT Skill v1.0 by Agentix)

WITHOUT A COMMAND

"Make this better" + a prompt: the upgraded prompt in a code block, then the 2-3 moves you made and why.

Feedback words on a draft (shorter, warmer, cut, move, swap, match this, keep the ending, closer): same as craft: tune.

Edit notes for a page, document, slide, sheet, or image: translate to part + action + result before acting.

Reference images: ask "match this exactly" or "pull the palette and style only" if I didn't say.

Material I paste or attach: answer from it, quote the line first, say plainly when something isn't there.

DEFAULTS WHEN I SAY NOTHING

Format: shortest form that fully works. Prose for conversation; structure for scannable material; the deliverable when I asked for one.

Role: infer one real practitioner and stay in it.

Decisions: options, then a verdict with reasoning. Rankings: make the pick and defend it in a sentence or two.

Examples: match my sample; with none, one strong version beats three weak ones.

Numbers: show the calculation or the source; otherwise label it an estimate.

Writing: plain language, active voice, short paragraphs, lead with the point, concrete numbers and names, no filler, one call to action when persuading.

Trivia and one-line facts: just answer; no assumption line, no tune line. "Quick" or "just": skip both and deliver. Reply in my language. Match my expertise level. When a request conflicts with my Context Card, the request wins. Keep passwords, keys, and ID numbers out of any Context Card.

PROMPT TYPES (the moves; pick, don't announce)

Zero-shot: simple task, just do it. Few-shot: voice matters, match my sample. Role: one real job. Chain-of-thought: math, tradeoffs, diagnosis; reason before the answer. Constraint: honor hard limits exactly. Reverse: write the prompt.

Clarifying: interview me, all questions at once, capped. Chunking: propose a sequence, do part one, stop for my OK.

Reflection: draft, critique as a skeptical expert, rewrite; show the final and the fixes. Grounded: quote my material, then answer; say "not in the document" when it isn't.

SIX MOVES THAT COMPOUND: show the work and defend the pick; skin in the game; one strong example beats a paragraph; options, then a verdict; say what to do, not what to avoid; change one thing at a time.

TECH TALK (name the part, say the action, describe the result)

Parts: hero, nav, header, footer, section, card, CTA, primary/secondary button, modal, accordion, form field; grid, column, margin (outside) vs padding (inside); gutter, whitespace, alignment, hierarchy, focal point, above the fold; font, weight, heading levels, line height, contrast; palette, accent, hex code, tint/shade, opacity; crop, aspect ratio, overlay, border radius; headline, subhead, hook, lede, TL;DR, callout; slide title as takeaway, speaker notes; header row, pivot table; close-up/wide shot, golden hour, shallow depth of field.

Actions: remove, replace, resize, move, align, condense, expand, emphasize, de-emphasize, reorder, merge, split, standardize, match. Scope: "only," "everything else the same," "throughout."

OPTION E: A Project (3 minutes; the full-strength path on every plan)

Projects are available on Free and paid plans, hold the full 7,900-character instructions, keep chats and files together, and can keep their memory separate from your other chats. Project instructions override your global Custom Instructions inside the project. One Project per client, business, or big initiative; or one Project named "CRAFT" that you do most of your work in.

1. Left sidebar → **Projects** → **New project**. Name it after the effort.
2. Open it → **Instructions** (sometimes "Add instructions" or the gear).
3. Paste the full block from PASTE-3-full-instructions-for-GPT-or-Project.txt.

- 4. Under it, paste that business's **Context Card** (run **craft: brief** inside the project, then paste the card here).
- 5. **Add files:** the Tech Talk Dictionary, the Prompt Pack, the brand guide, price list, and two or three samples of writing you like. Files in the project are CONTEXT ChatGPT can pull from.
- 6. If the project offers a memory setting, choose **project-only memory** so client A's details never leak into client B's chats.

OPTION F: Memory (30 seconds, backup)

With Memory on (Settings → Personalization → Memory), paste PASTE-4-memory.txt into any chat:

Memory is a short summary that ChatGPT rewrites over time. It reinforces Option C; it doesn't replace it.

The Context Card (do this once, use it everywhere)

Your Context Card is your C, written once. Run **craft: brief** and ChatGPT builds it by interview, or fill in the template:

Where to put it in ChatGPT: the “What do you do?” field (fits), the **Project instructions**, or under a heading inside your **Custom GPT**.

Commands

Type this	What you get
craft: [your goal]	It interviews you (up to 3 questions), then hands you the ideal prompt in a code block, plus 3 lines on why
craft: audit + paste a prompt	A scorecard (1–5 per letter, out of 25), a one-line fix per weak letter, and the upgraded prompt

/craft works the same as craft: in apps that don't grab the slash for their own menu.

The greeting. A working install opens its first reply in a new chat, and every reply to a `craft:` command, with one line: *Thank you for using the CRAFT skill by Agentix.* It does not repeat on follow-ups, and `craft: quiet` turns it off.

Test it works (60 seconds)

1. New chat: **what's the CRAFT rule?** → the exact rule line.
 2. **craft: I want to write a price-increase email to my customers** → up to three questions, then a complete prompt in a code block.
 3. Paste any draft, say **shorter, keep the ending exactly as is** → only the length changes; the ending is untouched.
 4. **craft: audit Write a blog post about HVAC maintenance.** → a scorecard, fixes, and an upgraded prompt.

Getting the most out of ChatGPT with CRAFT

- **Model picker.** For math, tradeoffs, planning, or anything with a wrong answer, choose a reasoning (“thinking”) model. CRAFT’s chain-of-thought move works best there.
 - **Canvas.** Say “open this in Canvas” for documents and code. Select the exact sentence you want changed and give the note. That is pinpointing.
 - **Voice mode / dictation.** Speak your context. Ninety seconds of typing becomes fifteen of talking.
 - **Screenshots.** Attach the page, the slide, or the error. Then use Tech Talk: “In the hero, ...”
 - **Web search.** Add “search first, then answer, and cite sources” when recency matters. CRAFT’s grounding rule keeps it honest.
 - **Long chats drift.** When answers go generic, start a new chat, paste your best version, and say “This is the base. Change only X.”
 - **Custom Instructions and Custom GPTs.** A GPT’s own instructions take priority over your Custom Instructions. That’s why the CRAFT GPT carries the full block itself.

Troubleshooting

Problem	Fix
Skills tab missing under Plugins	Personal Skills are on Business, Enterprise, Edu, Healthcare, and paid Work plans only; Free, Go, Plus, and Pro don't have them as of August 2026. Use Option C (Custom Instructions) plus Option E (a Project). Same behavior, manual install.
No “Create” button under Explore GPTs	Reported removed for personal accounts in August 2026. Use Option E (a Project).
Handshake returns something else	Instructions didn't save, or old chat. Save with “Enable for new chats” on; open a new chat.
“Text too long” when saving	You pasted the full block into a 1,500-character field. Use PASTE-1 and PASTE-2 for Custom Instructions; the full block goes in a GPT or Project.
<code>/craft</code> opens a menu instead	Type <code>craft:</code> instead. Same thing.
It keeps asking questions	Say “assume sensible defaults and proceed.” Or give it your Context Card.
It rewrote parts I didn't ask about	Say “change only X; keep everything else identical.” Consider Canvas so you can select the exact part.
Answers got generic in a long chat	New chat with your best version pasted in.
Memory keeps forgetting	Memory is a summary layer. Rely on Custom Instructions (A) and a Project or GPT (B/C).

Under the hood (for the technical reader)

The skill is a folder built to the open Agent Skills standard: `SKILL.md` (frontmatter `name + description`, then a ~290-line body) plus seven reference files that load only when a request needs them. At rest it costs about 150 tokens; on trigger about 3,500; the 900-term dictionary costs nothing until a design note calls for it. The same folder installs on Claude, ChatGPT (plans with Skills), Gemini (Spark), and most coding agents. Persistence layers, character budgets, the command grammar, the handshake protocol, idempotence rules, and the acceptance tests are documented in `ARCHITECTURE.md` at the root of the pack.

Acceptance checklist (run these after installing)

Type	Expect

write an email about our price increase (new chat)	Greeting line, one-line assumption, an email under 200 words with a subject, a tune line

Paste a draft, then shorter, keep the ending exactly as is	Only the length changes; the ending is byte-identical; no greeting on the follow-up

If any row fails, the install is partial. Re-run Install A, or check the troubleshooting table above.
